All made possible by the support of Scottsdale voters through 2019 bond funding, totaling \$13.1 million in improvements that ensure the park's next 50 years are even brighter.

Regional collaboration is bringing improvements to Pima Road



This comprehensive improvement project, taking place from McDowell Road north to Via Linda, will enhance more than just the road. It will also improve pedestrian and bicycle access and modernize flood control infrastructure.

Pima Road serves as a vital connector in Scottsdale, linking nearly 12,000 daily drivers to their commutes, local businesses, neighborhoods and regional

freeways. The road serves as a border between Scottsdale, on the west, to our neighbors on the east – the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community (SRPMIC).

SRPMIC is leading the project with collaboration from Scottsdale, the Federal Highway Administration, Maricopa Association of Governments and the Flood Control District of Maricopa County.

To minimize disruption, one lane of traffic in each direction on Pima Road will remain open throughout most of the project. While no long-term closures are expected, short-term closures at major intersections may occur.

Around the city



Scottsdale City Hall has new security measures to enhance safety for employees, visitors and the public. The upgrades include security screenings at designated entry points, bag checks and increased security personnel.

These enhancements align with the city's summer schedule, when visitor volume and meeting activity tend to be lower.

Scottsdale has created a new **Transportation and Infrastructure Department** – a modernized structure that combines capital project management and transportation services into one coordinated team.



This alignment brings together the city's engineers with its transportation team to plan, design and deliver Scottsdale's critical infrastructure and mobility projects. Previously, these responsibilities were divided between two separate divisions, Capital Project Management and Transportation & Streets.

To streamline operations and enhance neighborhood safety, the city has transitioned its **Code Enforcement** team from Planning & Development Services to the Scottsdale Police Department.

The realignment allows for a more coordinated response to quality-of-life issues such as property maintenance, zoning violations and public nuisance complaints.



When it comes to protecting and serving the city, the **Scottsdale Police Department** doesn't go it alone – they have some furry, four-legged partners helping them out.

From powerful patrol horses to sharp-nosed K-9s and comforting crisis dogs, the department's service animals play a key role in keeping the city safe, secure and supported. They're also trusted companions who help foster stronger connections between the department and the public. State law expands hours for construction activities. The new state law, [ARS §9-500.52](https://legis.wisconsin.gov/statutes/statute/ars/9/500/52), now permits construction activity from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturdays from May 1 – Oct. 15. It also allows concrete to be poured one hour before general construction activities begin, at 4 a.m. weekdays and 6 a.m. Saturdays.

From Oct. 16 to April 30, construction activity is permitted from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays. Concrete pour hours are not adjusted during the winter/spring months.

Construction activity is not permitted on Sundays.

New Hours for Construction Activity

ARS §9-500.52, passed in 2025, expands the hours in which cities must allow construction activity.
